## OFFICERS SCHOOL MEETINGS

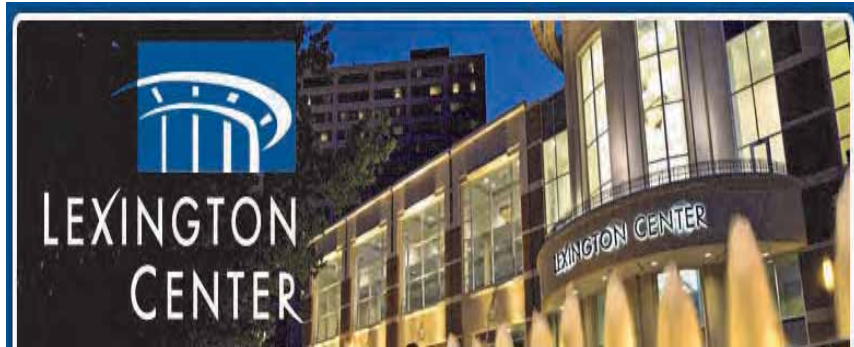
### KENTUCKY FIRE COMMISSION

## NFPA ELECTRIC VEHICLE SAFETY TRAINING FOR FIRST RESPONDERS

### *TRAIN THE TRAINER*

NFPA's Electric Vehicle Safety Training is a new course that provides firefighters and first responders with the information and materials necessary to respond to emergency situations involving all **advanced electric vehicles and hybrid vehicles** on the road today.

The program includes an overview of EV electrical and safety systems, identification of electric and hybrid vehicles, immobilization process, electrical power-down procedures, emergency operations (battery fire, submersion), EV extrication awareness (including high-strength steel), and recommended practices for vehicle fires.

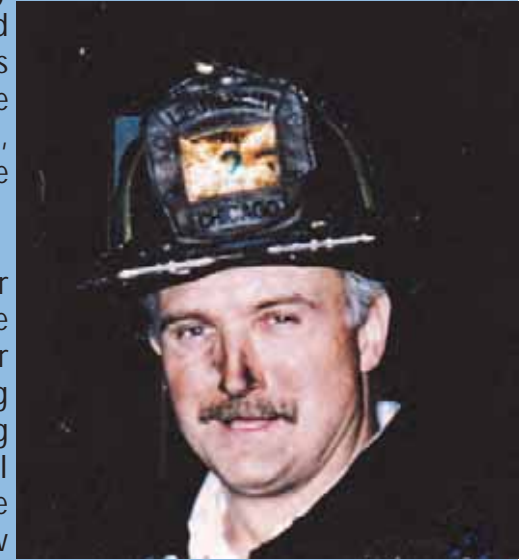

Steve is a 32-year member of the Chicago Fire Department currently serving as a Deputy District Chief. He has been a chief officer for the last 14 years during which time he has also held the positions of Battalion Chief, Director of Training, and as Chief of Fire Academy Operations. He worked his way through the ranks serving on some of the city's busiest engines, trucks and heavy rescue squads.

A fire service instructor for over 20 years, Steve has taught classes all over the nation, including FDIC, Fire Engineering Weekends, International Association of Fire Chiefs, as well as New York State, Oklahoma, Texas, Colorado, Alaska, California, South Dakota, Wisconsin, Iowa, and Michigan State Fire Chiefs. He is a staff instructor at the Illinois Fire Service Institute, RICO Fire Training, Harold Washington College, and the Chicago Fire Academy.

Steve Chikerotis is the author of "Firefighters From The Heart" (Thomson Delmar 2006) as well as several published fire service articles.

Steve also does a lot of work with the television and motion picture industry as a technical advisor, safety officer and screen writer. He has worked on dozens of major motion pictures including the movie "Backdraft".



## 2. COMMAND 101:

### THE INITIAL DECISIONS

The initial decisions made at an incident set the stage for success or failure. A company officer is usually the first on the scene and is tasked with making a quick assessment, often with limited resources! This class will prepare company officers to make sound strategic and tactical decisions. Good decisions aren't made by mistake. They come through good training and strong fundamentals. Your firefighters deserve a leader who will look out for their interest, keeping them from harm's way. Don't cheat them!

## 3. FEAR FACTOR: WHAT DO YOU FEAR?

Everyone fears something. What do you fear? As a fire officer we hope you understand the need to do the right things ALL the time. There is no room for error when you are dealing with others lives. Doing the right things has nothing to do with the size of your department, career or volunteer, or your call volume. ***You should fear losing or injuring those who serve with you or those you protect. Your actions or inactions may cause you to lose or injure one of your own.*** Don't let this happen to you.

**INSTRUCTOR: CHIEF RON RICHARDS**

A Pennsylvania State Fire Instructor, Chief Richards has over 35 years of experience in both career and volunteer fire services. Chief Richards worked 27 years in various capacities with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, having served in various positions including Fire Chief, Fire Marshal, Fire and Safety Specialist and Fire Instructor. He recently retired after his final assignment where he was responsible for coordinating and implementing ICS and NIMS to over 14,000 emergency responders.

Chief Richards serves on the NFPA Technical Committee "Recommended Practice in Emergency Service Organization Risk Management" and the 1201 Technical Committee "Standard for Providing Emergency Services to the Public". He graduated from the State University of NY with a B.S. in Fire Service Administration. He is founder and the CEO of Task Force 1, Inc. Currently in Wayne County, PA, he serves as Fire Chief.

#### **4. BEYOND HOSES AND HELMETS**

Beyond Hoses and Helmets is a course on the strategy and tactics of leading a volunteer or combination fire/rescue organization. The course was designed by practicing chief officers and delivers real world expertise through an interactive educational experience. The course provides instruction in problem solving, marketing, recruitment, retention, leadership, team building, training development, conflict resolution and principles of negotiation. This course is designed for organizations which are staffed by volunteers, part-time, paid on-call and/or career personnel.

This course was developed by the Volunteer and Combination Officer Section (VCOS) of the International Association of Fire Chiefs and is supported by Pierce Fire Apparatus. The United States Fire Administration and the National Emergency Training Center provided technical support in the development of course materials.

**INSTRUCTOR: CHIEF NORVIN COLLINS, OREGON**

Chief Collins is a 22 year veteran of the fire service, currently serving as Fire Chief/CEO for the Sauvie Island Volunteer Fire Department and as a Division Chief with Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue, Oregon. Chief Collins has a Bachelor of Science in Fire Administration, is currently working on his Masters in Psychology / Organizational Leadership and is currently enrolled in the National Fire Academy EFO Program. Chief Collins has served both as a fire instructor and a paramedic instructor. He has presented programs throughout the nation. His awards include Firefighter of the Year in 1995 and 3 Unit Citations for actions taken during major incidents.

#### **5. BIGGER, FASTER, HOTTER: HOW MODERN CONSTRUCTION SHOULD AFFECT YOUR FIREGROUND DECISION-MAKING**

Much has been learned in recent years regarding the performance of modern construction components under fire conditions, but how do we apply that knowledge at the street level? With today's larger, lightweight-constructed homes, we cannot continue to approach fires in this type of structure with the same set of tactics that have worked in years past. This course examines the dangers associated with fires in newer homes, including "McMansion"-type mega-homes that are popping up across the country, and the tactical adjustments that must be considered to keep our companies safe.

Expect a valuable discussion on risk-benefit analysis, strategy and tactics, and actions that your personnel can take before the fire to ensure a more positive outcome.

Brian Collins is a 16-year student of the fire & emergency services, beginning his career as a volunteer in Western Kentucky. Brian holds a Bachelor of Science in Fire Protection Administration from Eastern Kentucky University. He is a career Lieutenant with the City of Brentwood Fire & Rescue, and also serves as the Assistant Chief of Operations for the Pleasant View Volunteer Fire Department, both in Tennessee. Brian has taught a variety of classes at the local, state, and national levels, including FDIC and Firehouse Expo.

## 6. INTELLIGENCE TRAINING FOR THE FIRE SERVICE

### Working to Keep Our Firefighters Safe! / What Every Fire Officer Needs to Know!

In May 2011, the arrest of two Iraqi refugees (affiliated with Al-Qa'ida in Iraq) from Bowling Green, KY demonstrated that the Commonwealth is not exempt from terrorism and criminal issues. Kentucky's fire service, through the efforts of the KY Association of Fire Chiefs, the KY Fire Commission and the KY Office of Homeland Security, has taken a proactive approach to protecting our citizens and firefighters by having a fire service liaison assigned to the KY Intelligence Fusion Center.

Information sharing is another tool used across the nation to keep our firefighters safe! Firefighters are often first to arrive on an incident scene, allowed into industry for the purpose of preplanning, and spend countless hours conducting home inspections. These actions could result in the observance of suspicious or criminal activity. Suspicious activity, whether occurring in rural or urban settings, can be the key to identifying criminal and terrorist plots being developed on a local, state, or national scale. Providing for the safety of your citizens and firefighters is a top priority of every fire service manager. This class details the capabilities of the KY Intelligence Fusion Center (KIFC) and identifies recommended actions and guidance to effectively report suspicious activity to the KIFC. You will learn methods in which information from the KIFC will be provided to your department.

## 7. MAKING A DIFFERENCE IN FIREGROUND SAFETY

### The Incident Safety Officer's Role

The Incident Safety Officer is an important role of any operation. This individual works directly with the Incident Commander to help manage the risks of personnel on the fireground. This individual must be a very capable and knowledgeable person, and have an understanding of what the ISO's job is on the fireground. Unfortunately, there are times when someone is put into the position just to "fill" that position, with no knowledge of what their job actually is.

The focus of this class is on the Incident Safety Officer's responsibilities for ensuring operational safety during fireground operations. We will discuss hazardous areas of fireground operations, and what the Safety Officer should be looking for in order to keep crews safe. The role of the Company Officer as a Safety Officer will also be examined. Emphasis will be placed on the ISO's ability in forecasting unsafe acts, conditions and behaviors, before they occur. By understanding the dynamics of the fireground, the ISO may be able to predict what will most likely happen next. Case studies of LODD reports will be presented, and the "chain" of events that led to the firefighter's death.

Eric Duffy is an Assistant Chief with the Pleasure Ridge Park (KY) Fire Department, and is a SFRT Area 6 Instructor. He is a 26 year veteran of the fire service, and holds certifications as an Incident Safety Officer and Health and Safety Officer. He also serves as a guest instructor at the Texas A&M Industrial Fire School, and is a committee member of the Southeastern IAFC Safety, Health and Survival Section.

## 8. LEADING WITH ATTITUDE

Go to just about any fire station and you will likely hear someone talking about how it used to be. They talk about the values and work ethic they had when they came on the job, back when the mission was clear and company commander was king.

This program will explore how we, as individuals, can help ensure our departments are on track and ways we can truly make a difference in our organization, regardless of rank.

The Leading with Attitude program is a nameless and rankless “gut check” into how we contribute to the fire service. The program offers tangible ways we can improve our job for today and for future generations. The course calls “us” out to be part of the problem, or part of the solution!

The program will also explore the concept of loyalty alignment. What does it mean to be a good ‘follower’ without becoming a ‘yes-man’? Each of us are empowered to make positive change, but we must accept that responsibility and take charge of our lives!

Chief Buchanan began his fire service career in 1982 and currently serves as the Operations Division Chief for Hanover, Virginia Fire and EMS. Hanover is a large combination system consisting of more than 500 paid and volunteer personnel.

Chief Buchanan is author of the “Volunteer Training Officer’s Handbook” and lectures throughout the country on fire service leadership and training topics.

He is co-author of the Red, White & Blue Ribbon Reports from the Volunteer / Combination Officer’s Section of the International Association of Fire Chiefs

Chief Buchanan currently serves on the Board of Directors of the International Society of Fire Service Instructors and serves on the Technical Committee on Fire Services Training for the National Fire Protection Association.



## 9. STRUCTURAL TACTICS WITH LIMITED MANPOWER

Fire departments are challenged more than ever to provide adequate staffing for essential services. This program examines how departments can make the most of the staffing available and still operate in a safe manner. Some long-time golden rules of firefighting are challenged in light of new fire science research and data. Areas of focus include fire attack, ventilation and rapid intervention.

## 10. INCIDENT COMMAND WITH TABLE TOP EXERCISE

Today's private and public emergency response officials are charged with near-perfect preparation and responses to situations that affect life safety of the community and emergency responders, protecting the environment and property conservation. These emergencies are so complex that being prepared for them may seem overwhelming. A tabletop gathers officials and presents them with a hypothetical emergency scenario, preferably described as a series of unfolding events, to allow them to coordinate, think through and discuss their response. Attendees participate in contingency planning exercises and "tabletop" exercises designed to enhance skills for planning and managing an emergency response utilizing the incident command structure.

The class will include table top work with the City of Yurtville. The instructor created the City of Yurtville while working for Borden Chemical in 1998 and has delivered it to over 5,000 emergency responders across North America since then.

**Gary Yurt** – President of ISTS, 27 years in Fire Service, 14 of those years as a Chief Officer. Gary has worked for 20 years in private industry for two Fortune 500 companies as a Safety Engineer, Safety Manager and Emergency Manager.

**Edward (Jody) Meiman** – 20 years in the Fire Service and is a Battalion Chief with Louisville Division of Fire. Jody also works as a Safety Specialist for ISTS traveling across the country on a variety of technical rescue and ICS projects.

**Mike Wallingford Jr.** – 16 years in the Fire Service and is Firefighter/Haz-Mat Specialist with the Jeffersontown Fire Protection District. Mike also works as a Safety Specialist for ISTS traveling across the country on a variety of environmental, safety and health projects.

**Mike Stone** – 28 years in the Fire Service and just retired from the Lexington, KY Fire and EMS as a Lieutenant Haz-Mat Duty Officer. Mike also works as a Safety Specialist for ISTS traveling across the country on a variety of Haz-Mat and emergency preparedness projects.

## **11. A CAR CAN KILL YOU AT ZERO MILES PER HOUR AND WHAT'S JUNK IN THE JUNKYARD**

Dwight Clark's extrication presentations have received rave reviews each year at the Officers School since 1999 and as students have requested, we have invited him back for a return engagement. This class will begin with the latest information on dangers to rescue personnel during a vehicle rescue event and how to avoid them. Students will then explore the differences between rescue drills in the junkyard and with real wrecks they respond to on the highway. Students will learn how vehicles are constructed and how construction is modified during a crash. The instructor will teach students how to predict "hard points" and "soft points" to reduce extrication time. Students will improve their evaluation of the extrication scene, choose the correct tools to do the job, allowing them to reduce the time and effort during the extrication, all providing for quicker transport and better outcomes for the patient.

Dwight Clark has been closely associated with vehicle extrication since 1979, teaching in 23 states, Canada, Mexico, Virgin Islands, Puerto Rico, United Kingdom and South Africa. Dwight has become one of the most popular instructors in the history of the Officers School. Dwight currently serves as Deputy Chief of the Forsyth, Georgia Fire Department and is a Contributing Editor for Fire Rescue Magazine. Previously Dwight served as an Instructor with the Georgia Fire Academy. Dwight is a founding member of the Transportation Emergency Rescue Committee of the IAFC and has served as judge and

evaluator in 11 International Vehicle Rescue Competitions. Dwight's career in the fire service began in 1959 with the San Angelo, Texas, Fire Department, where he retired in 1991 as an Assistant Fire Chief.

## **12. RESPONSE TO LARGE TRUCK AND BUS INCIDENTS AND WHAT'S NEW ABOUT WHAT'S NEW**

This is a new program that Dwight Clark introduced at the 2001 Officers School and has presented throughout the nation, and we are pleased to have it presented at the 2012 Officers School. This program will build upon your knowledge and skills in vehicle rescue and explore the world of heavy rescue. This program will introduce you to the unique construction and extrication characteristics of large trucks and buses, including school buses and special needs buses. A school bus incident may be one of your most challenging responses and this class will assist you in preparing for that response. Specific rescue techniques to be used on large trucks and school buses will be presented to enable you to effectively respond to these types of incidents.

In the afternoon, Dwight will explore what's new as the class reviews construction components, new fuels, hybrid cars and new airbag systems.

### **13. "WITHIN THE WAKE – The Role of a Supervisor Following the Death of a Hero"**

In the wake of tragedy, participants will be better prepared to respond to the real needs of the affected families – the one within the agency and the one at home. Topics include: Immediate Concerns Following LODD; LODD Effects on Co-Workers and Their Families; Family Support Considerations: Immediate and Long-Term; Maintaining Perspective and Values; Ego, Politics, and Special Interests following LODD; Benefits, Eligibility, and Important Decisions; The Media and LODD; and Dealing with Special Circumstances: "Friendly Fire," Suicide, and More.

Eric Johnson served 9 years in EMS and 19 in law enforcement – retiring from Louisville Metro Police in 2004. Since 2000, he has responded to line of duty police deaths in Kentucky, provided support to families, and assisted with funeral planning. In 2004, he helped create SUPPORTING HEROES – a non-profit organization that supports families of fire, police, and EMS workers in Kentucky and Indiana who fall in the line of duty. Since inception, the organization has responded to 87 deaths. Eric is the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation's L.A.S.T. Coordinator for Indiana.

### **14. KENTUCKY FIRE COMMISSION 2012 AND BEYOND**

The Health and Wellness Initiatives, including CPAT and Peer Fitness, Communications trailers, History / Recruitment trailer including the new volunteer firefighter recruitment project, and the junior firefighter program are just some of the items to be reviewed. The 2012 Kentucky General Assembly will be covered. Seldom in the history of Kentucky's fire service have so many changes been occurring at the same time as we have had during the past few years, and we are sure to see even more projects in the future. This class will provide you the latest information on a host of Fire Commission programs and policies and their effect on your department, including who is handling the various programs, who to call on a variety of issues, and plans for the future.

Commission staff and members will assist in the presentation of this program.

## **15. BECOMING A BETTER COMPANY OFFICER...A STREET SMART APPROACH**

The company officer has been the backbone for effective fireground operations for more than 150 years. The decisions made by these officers and their ability to perform fireground tasks can greatly impact the outcome of the incident and more importantly, the safety and well-being of their crew. This high impact program is designed to enhance the safety and effectiveness of the modern fireground for current and future officers.

This fast paced multi-media presentation will address some of the more common issues facing the fire officer in today's dynamic fireground environment. Topics to be covered in this program include incident size-up, modern building construction and its flaws, fireground command and control, strategic/tactical concepts and considerations for residential buildings, firefighter safety, RIT operations, response to "routine" emergencies, 'what was I thinking', and tricks of the trade.

Sixteen students and one adult were transported by ground. Two adults were flown to out of state hospitals. The instructors will review the challenges, communications, coordination, mutual aid and much more about this incident.

On August 27th, 2006 Comair Flight 5191 crashed just outside of the Lexington Airport, resulting in 49 fatalities with one survivor. An incident this size brings many local, state and federal agencies to the scene. The instructor will review the challenges, communications, coordination, state and national news media, scene security, and much more about this incident. Scott Lanter, Chief of Public Safety and Operations at Blue Grass Airport, is uniquely qualified as he is certified by Kentucky as a firefighter, instructor, EMT and law enforcement officer. Scott has been with the airport since 1987.

### **FIREFIGHTERS TRAPPED IN STRUCTURE FIRE AT 606 CAMP STREET, LOUISVILLE**

Louisville Major Henry Ott will present information on a two story structure fire where the attic came in on interior firefighters. Major Ott will review the 30 minutes of efforts to rescue trapped firefighters and the lessons students can learn from this incident.

The Company Officer may be the most important member of any fire department. This class will review hot button issues that impact company officers currently and have potential for impact into the future. This class will help you look at where you are today and where the fire service (you?) will be tomorrow. Included in this fast paced class will be issues including Command Presence, Fireground Discipline, Ventilation Profiling, Survivability Profiling, Crew Resource Management, Doing the Right Thing For Your Community and Your Organization and other hot button issues.

Steve is a member of the International Fire Service Training Association (IFSTA) Board of Directors, and its current Chairman. Steve has an MPA from the University of Cincinnati and is a National Fire Academy Executive Fire Officer (EFO) program graduate.

Steve is chairman of the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) for Search & Rescue for the Ohio Fire Chiefs' Association and the Ohio Emergency Management Agency.

He is a member of the faculty at the University of Cincinnati College of Applied Science and has taught Hazardous Materials and Incident Command topics for the Ohio Fire Academy.

## **21. IMPROVING SAFETY THROUGH REHAB**

Every year almost half of the deaths to firefighters and emergency responders in general are from stress from the job. This can be from heat stress, cold stress, and work stress in general. NFPA 1584 is the Standard for Incident Rehabilitation and Medical Monitoring. This standard covers rehabilitation for both incidents and training. Students will learn what is included in the standard, how to set up incident rehabilitation, what and how much fluids responders need to continue to work safely, and options available to equip your rehab center. Students will also learn about vital signs to watch for and signs and symptoms that a trained responder can watch for that will save a responders life.

Mark Hammond is the Area 10 Training Coordinator for the Kentucky Fire Commission State Fire Rescue Training. An instructor since 1988, Mark joined SFRT in 1992 as a part time instructor and became the Area Coordinator in 1998. Mark served as a full time paramedic from 1991 to 1998 for Boyd County EMS. Mark served as a Boyd County deputy coroner since 2008 and was elected coroner in January 2011.

Marty Johnson is a full time paramedic with the Boyd County EMS and is a part time instructor with State Fire Rescue Training Area 10. Marty completed his paramedic training and certification in 1996 at Maysville Community College.

## 22. IMPROVING KENTUCKY FIREFIGHTER HEALTH, WELLNESS AND FITNESS

This class will provide an overview of efforts by the Kentucky Fire Commission helping you to improve the health, wellness and fitness of your firefighters. This program will benefit both volunteer and career fire departments. The IAFC / IAFF Peer Fitness Program seeks to improve the health, wellness, fitness, safety, and performance of firefighters. Students may bring exercise clothing and participate in a fitness evaluation test. Information will be provided on the Kentucky Fire Commission's grant program for physical fitness equipment for fire departments. The class will include information on the annual visit of the Firefighter Combat Challenge Competition to Lexington and the benefits of participation either as a competitor or spectator. The class will close out with a refresher on the Hepatitis Vaccine Program and the benefit to all firefighters.

## 23. METH LABS - A FIREFIGHTER'S NIGHTMARE

This class provides a survey of clandestine methamphetamine manufacturing, beginning with an overview of methamphetamine production and trafficking. The hazards of responding to methamphetamine labs, including environmental contamination, potential explosions and personal exposure are highlighted. Also covered are indicators of a clandestine laboratory, items and equipment utilized, and the ephedrine/ammonia, or "Nazi", method of manufacturing methamphetamine. This class will explore how cooperation between law enforcement, EMS, fire and rescue agencies will improve the safety and effectiveness of your response to a meth lab incident.

Ricky King is the Chief of the Central City Fire Department. Chief King is President of the Green River Firefighters Association and a member of the Area 3 Fire Rescue Training staff.

These instructors bring with them over 60 years of combined law enforcement and firefighting experience. These instructors will present to students information about methamphetamine labs and expose you to an effective operation between response agencies, where cooperation begins in the planning process and continues until the incident is terminated.

## 24. INVESTIGATING ARSON FIRES:

### Current Issues Including Firefighter Arson

With the decline in the economy, and the increase in insurance related fires, and other societal issues, the fire service must adapt and implement a comprehensive detection and investigative approach to fire ground activities. Scene observation and preservation issues are critical, proper notification of Fire Marshal, State Police and ATF can make or break a prosecution, and it all begins with the fire department response.

With the growing number of firefighter arson issues facing the nation and the state, we will address and explain the issue, to prepare you as an officer to recognize, deal with and minimize negative publicity if the need arises.

Don Parker retired as an Arson Investigator for the Kentucky State Police, serving from 1989-2010. Don has joined Unified Investigations and Science, Inc. Don's career began as a Forensic Specialist/Chemist at the KSP Crime Laboratory. Don is a graduate of Berea College.

Phil Fogle is a Deputy State Marshal in the Hazardous Materials Division, and has investigated many cause and origin fires. Phil has been in this position with the Fire Marshal's office for nine years. Phil is Assistant Chief of the Masonville Fire Department and is a Past President of the Green River Firefighters Assoc.

## 25. EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES: Functions in the Incident Command System

This NFA course is directed to emergency response personnel who are responsible for implementing the initial EMS functions of an Incident Command System at medium or large sized incidents. Students will practice the use of ICS in coordination with other public safety responders. As a follow-up to ICS-100 and ICS-200 training, this course will present scenarios requiring responders to structure their EMS resources within the guidance of NIMS ICS, as appropriate to the needs of the different incident types.

This course will provide the necessary tools for all responders who may be called upon for depositions and/or courtroom testimony relevant to facts witnessed on arrival at a scene. It also will address report-writing skills after witnessing an event, and oral presentation skills if asked to describe the event in a court of law.

## 27. JUVENILE FIRESETTER INTERVENTION SPECIALIST I

The class will address the NFPA 1035 including Introduction, Primary Prevention, Identification and Intake, Who Sets Fires and Why, and Interviewing and Intervention Strategies. Students will learn to conduct an interview with firesetters and their families using prepared forms and guidelines.

## 28. STRATEGY AND TACTICS FOR INITIAL COMPANY OPERATIONS

The course includes: Communications Model; Quick Access Prefire Plan (QAP); relationship between incident priorities, strategy, tactics, and implementation in the Command Sequence; the six steps required to implement the Tactical Action Model; ventilation tactics; rescue tactics and developing a rescue action plan; fire confinement and extinguishment; hoselines; tactical considerations for water supplies from municipal, static, and portable sources; protecting exposures, achieving salvage, and overhaul; special construction factors of single-family dwellings; determine appropriate strategy, select correct tactics, and operate within an appropriate Incident Command System (ICS) organization at a fire in a single-family dwelling.

## 29. LEADERSHIP I: STRATEGIES FOR COMPANY SUCCESS

This course provides the basic skills and tools needed to perform effectively as a leader in the fire service environment. This *Leadership* course addresses techniques and approaches to problem-solving, identifying and assessing the needs of subordinates, running meetings effectively in the emergency services environment, and decision making for the emergency services officer.
