1. ESSENTIALS OF FIREFIGHTING / BASIC 20 Hours

This class will explore the basic skills every firefighter needs to know. This class will benefit new firefighters as well as seasoned veterans. The subjects taught will follow the Kentucky Fire Commission's recommended initial 20 hour list. Subjects will include administration & organization – 2, safety – 2, fire behavior – 1, extinguishers – 1, personal protective equipment – 3, forcible entry – 1, ventilation – 1, ropes – 1, ladders – 2, fire hose, nozzles & appliances – 2, fire control – 1, loss control – 2, driver training – 1. This class will include both classroom presentations and hands on evolutions. This class will begin on Friday evening at 6:00pm. Students may elect to attend Friday, Saturday or Sunday sessions.

THIS IS A 2 ½ DAY CLASS OFFERED ON FRIDAY, SATURDAY and SUNDAY

Junior Firefighters are welcome in this class.

2. HARD TO GET HOURS

This class is ideal for the firefighter that is almost certified but lacks just a few needed hours that are “hard to get”. This two-day class will offer the following course topics: Emergency & Disaster Planning (2), Communications (3), Fire Investigation (3), Fire Protection Systems (3), Aircraft (3), Fire Extinguishers (2).

3. EMT CONTINUING EDUCATION

This class will follow the NCCP (National Continued Competency Program) as prescribed by the NREMT. For the EMT level, there are 20 mandated hours identified, 10 hours identified by your local jurisdiction and 10 hours identified by yourself. This course will provide the 20 mandated hours identified by the NREMT for EMT NCCP refresher training. This training will cover the topics for the EMR providers as well. This class will use the Mobile Healthcare Lab to practice with some high-fidelity manikins to get a real-life experience working with patients.

4. HAZARDOUS MATERIALS AWARENESS and OPERATIONS

The Kentucky Fire Commission requires that a firefighter must have 8 hours of Haz-mat Awareness and 12 hours of Haz-mat Operations to become certified as a firefighter in Kentucky. This Haz-mat Awareness course will cover information necessary for any first responder whether in the fire service, EMS, law enforcement or other responding agency. Information covered will be consistent with NFPA 472 as well as 29 CFR 1910.120. The Hazardous Materials Awareness level trained individual may work outside of the danger zone, away from the incident, but may not participate in the activities in or around the 'hot zone'. The Haz-mat Operations course will provide 4 hours of training at this level. This training that will enable the responder to respond to and function on a fireground involving hazardous materials but only in a defensive mode of operation. *The remaining 8 required hours can be obtained in the Basic Decon class (Class # 5).*

THIS CLASS WILL BE OFFERED ON FRIDAY EVENING and SATURDAY

Junior firefighters are welcome in this class.

This class will be all classroom lectures and no turnout gear will be required.

5. Basic Decon (HM Operations)

“Getting it off and Keeping it off” will be the main focus of this class. This class is a grant funded class through the NVFC and PHMSA. Students in this class will understand the B.E.S.T. model for Hazardous Materials Decon, they will have a knowledge of the differences between various levels of decontamination (ie. Emergency, mass, technical, gross.), they will have exposure to alternative means of decontamination including but not limited to: dry decon, air decon, disinfection, neutralization, etc., and students will understand the need to utilize a Safety Officer when conducting decontamination drills and/or exercises.

This class will be a great opportunity for both instructors and students: Instructors will learn to teach this subject and students will learn to perform the skills.

THIS IS A ONE DAY CLASS OFFERED ON SUNDAY

Junior firefighters are welcome in this class.

6. FIREFIGHTER SURVIVAL & RESCUE (Lectures only on Saturday)

The Kentucky Fire Commission mandates that firefighters need to attend the Firefighter Survival & Rescue course to attain certification as a Basic I firefighter in KY. The Firefighter Survival course is the first segment of this training course and is intended to illustrate to the student the procedures to implement and follow to save oneself in the event of a catastrophic event on the fireground. The Firefighter Rescue is the second segment of this course and is intended to train the firefighter how to work to rescue someone else in the event of a bad situation on the fireground. Firefighter Survival and Firefighter Rescue Classroom Lectures will be offered on Saturday.

THIS IS A ONE DAY CLASS OFFERED ON SATURDAY

7. FIREFIGHTER SURVIVAL & RESCUE (Skills only on Sunday)

The Kentucky Fire Commission mandates that firefighters need to attend the Firefighter Survival & Rescue course to attain certification as a firefighter in KY. This course in conjunction with the Lecture course is required for certification as a Basic II firefighter in Kentucky. There will be many skills presented in this course that will enable a firefighter to execute to save him/herself in the event that a catastrophic event occurs. The candidate in this class **MUST** complete ALL skills presented or they will **NOT** get credit for participation.

THIS IS A ONE DAY CLASS OFFERED ON SATURDAY

Junior firefighters are welcome in this class.

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8. Modern Vehicle Rescue

This class will begin with a short lecture to familiarize the student with extrication tools and principles. The class will travel to an off-site location to practice cutting techniques on small to large vehicles and also will have some technical scenarios to work through. This class will provide the students the opportunity to assess, plan, and implement extrication strategies in a variety of situations including passenger vehicles and larger commercial vehicles. Students registering for this class should come prepared to work for two full days of activities. This class size is limited to 30 students.

9. BASIC ROPE RESCUE

This is a hands-on course that introduces students to technical rope rescues. This course covers the technical aspect of rope equipment, as well as: Practical applications of rappelling/lowering techniques, anchor systems, safety systems, and communications. Students will learn techniques for life-saving operations in the vertical environment, while maintaining an adequate level of safety for the rescuer and the patient. Techniques will include, rappels, lock-offs, inversions, belays, and working with litters. Students should come prepared to work.

THIS IS A TWO-DAY CLASS OFFERED ON SATURDAY and SUNDAY

Equipment Needed: Helmet with a suspension system and chin strap (Fire helmets, OK), lace-up boots with ankle support, clean leather gloves, eye protection, and a positive attitude with a desire to learn.

10. NFA – Fire Investigation First Responders O0770

This two-day course presents a basic overview of fire investigation. Students will review the basics of fire chemistry and develop an understanding of the role of the first responder in relation to fire suppression and fire investigation. The course will stress the importance of fire scene awareness, evidence identification, preservation, and the basics of a fire investigation. Students will develop an appreciation of the convergence of suppression, investigation, science, and law.

11. Machinery Rescue (Man -vs- Machine)

Have you ever received a call for a subject stuck in an HVAC vent, a wedding ring stuck on a finger, or even a motorcycle accident victim impaled on a signpost? The rescuer often finds difficulty in approaching these situations simply because of the unknowns. This class will bring a new perspective to this type of incident. Instructors will provide “out of the box” ways of thinking that are usually not incorporated with normal fire service operations. This different train of thought will help the student develop a framework of techniques and tools that will make this operation smooth and safe. At the end of this class the student will be confident in proper tool choice for these incidents and able to operate with confidence on scene. This class focuses upon hands-on training using many different types of cutting tools to complete extrication scenarios.

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12. Forestry Fire Operations and Wildland Fire Behavior

Have you ever wondered what the Kentucky Division of Forestry has to offer when you have a wildland fire? Wardens from the KY Division of Forestry will be on hand leading the morning session and will detail what resources are available, what capabilities they have locally, as well explaining what your duties are when working a wildland fire within your jurisdiction.

The afternoon session will present the Kentucky Mandatory 3-hour Wildland Firefighting Awareness class developed for Kentucky Firefighters seeking certification by the Kentucky Fire Commission. Case histories will be presented in the program so we may learn how to keep from repeating the mistakes made in other tragic events.

13. ICS 300

Intermediate Incident Command System for Expanding Incidents

This 3-day course is designed for those emergency response personnel who would function in a Command or General Staff position during a large, complex incident or event, or personnel who are or would likely be part of a local or regional Incident Management Team during a major incident, whether single agency, multiagency or Unified Command. **Prerequisites:** Must successfully complete prerequisite courses ICS-100 and ICS-200 or equivalent prior to being accepted for this course. Have a working knowledge of the ICS. Have an agency or individual need to meet National Incident Management System-required training. Have responsibility within your organization to function in a Command and/or General Staff position.

14. GRAIN EMERGENCIES RESCUE

Grain Emergencies claim the lives of several every year. While we watch the news and see where a fire department or rescue company work to rescue or recover an individual, we may not fully understand the complexity of the operations and the specialized equipment required to perform those operations. This class will provide the opportunity to get in the grain with a simulated emergency and perform the steps to free the person utilizing a grain rescue tube. Dale Dobson with the KY Department of Agriculture will be on hand to show several options of grain rescue tubes and each will be available to use in the grain. On Sunday, there will be a field trip to visit local farm grain storage facilities to facilitate the pre-planning process for facilities in your jurisdiction.

15. FLASHOVER (Classroom lecture and Burn)

Welcome to the Kentucky Fire Commission Flashover Recognition & Survival Course. This course was created and adopted to provide structural firefighters in Kentucky, a safe and secure system of Flashover training. This course will be in two parts: the lecture in the morning (required for Basic I certification) and the chamber burn in the afternoon (required for Basic II certification). The goal is to improve recognition and provide survival techniques to save firefighters from injury and death from rapid fire progression and related phenomena.

PREREQUISITES: Completion of NFPA 1403 required training components prior to enrolling using Live Fire Course Competency Validation form (or similar verification). Any student with facial hair that impedes the seal of the face piece will not be allowed to participate in accordance with 29 CFR 1910.134 (OSHA). Protective gear will be inspected prior to entry into the trailer. All gear must be within the 10-year from manufacture date.

THIS IS A ONE-DAY CLASS OFFERED ON SATURDAY

Required Equipment: In-date turnout gear and SCBA

16. Fire Instructor I Methodology

This course will address the information that is necessary for the Level I Instructor. The Kentucky Fire Commission will certify a Level I Instructor if the necessary criteria have been met. This course prepares candidates with basic knowledge to perform at the Instructor I Level, as defined by National Fire Protection Association Standard 1041. This knowledge is necessary to develop skills for preparing and presenting training for personnel of fire and emergency services organizations. **PREREQUISITES:** IFSAC Firefighter I & Firefighter II, HS Diploma or GED, and 2 years certified Firefighter. This course meets the requirements established by KBEMS for the methodology course required for EMS Instructor certification.

This course will run over two weekends: October 20 – 5:00pm-9:00pm, Oct. 21 & 22 – 8:00am-5:00pm. Oct. 27 – 5:00pm-9:00pm, Oct. 28 – 8:00am-5:00pm, Evaluation is Oct. 29 – 8:00am – Finish. At that time there will be a \$25.00 fee for the written examination (Check payable to KCTCS).

Students are required to purchase a textbook (IFSAC Fire and Emergency Services Instructor, 9th Edition) PRIOR to class start date.

The Fire Department Junior Firefighter (JRFF) Program Coordinator **SHALL** provide all JRFF's with a Training and Emergency Contact Information Form prior to the JRFF attending classes outside of the JRFF primary department. The information included above is required at a minimum. Fire Departments may collect more information if necessary.

Inform participating Junior Firefighters that they **must keep a copy of this form with them at all times while participating in fire department activities.** Class instructors and/or school/conference leadership may randomly request to see a copy of the form during the conduct of classes and or event. If the participant is unable to provide a copy, the instructor, other department leadership, or conference organizers shall not allow the child to continue participation until the form is produced.

Live Fire Course Competency Validation/Fitness for Duty Form

Required for all students before participating in SFRT Live Fire Training

NFPA 1403 (2018 Edition) 4.3.1 - 4.3.3 require that all participants must have prior training and meet prerequisites in certain subjects before participating in live fire training. These minimum subjects include:

1) Safety; 2) Fire Behavior; 3) Portable Extinguishers; 4) Personal Protective Equipment & SCBA; 5) Ladders; 6) Fire Hose, Appliances, and Streams; 7) Overhaul; 8) Water Supply; 9) Ventilation; 10) Forcible Entry; 11) Building Construction. Specific prerequisite training must also be met in these areas: Fire Dynamics; Health and Safety; Fundamentals of Fire Behavior; Fire Development in Compartments; Nozzle Techniques and Door Control.

The Chief Officer of _____ Fire Department authorizes that _____ completed the minimum training/prerequisites and may participate in the live fire training evolutions present by SFRT.

NFPA 1403 (2018 Edition) 4.4.1 requires that all participants must be rehabbed in accordance with NFPA 1584, Chapter 6. Before being released from the rehab area to participate in a State Fire Rescue Training live fire training evolution, normal conditions are considered to consist of: heart rate of 60-100; respiratory rate of 12-20; systolic blood pressure less than 160; diastolic blood pressure of less than 100; pulse oximetry of 95% or greater. Participants are encouraged to periodically check their vital signs and seek appropriate medical attention for abnormal signs/symptoms.

Participants must be a member of a Fire Department, Industrial Fire Brigade or Junior Firefighter program (Ages 15-17) that is recognized by the Kentucky Fire Commission to participate in live fire training delivered by State Fire Rescue Training. ID's will be checked by SFRT instructors before allowing students to participate in live fire training and some evolutions/activities are restricted for 15-17 year old Junior Firefighters (See current Junior Firefighter Guidelines on KY Fire Commission website.) All turnout gear must be less than 10 years of age. Per NFPA 1403 (2018 Edition) A4.9.5 it is recommended that all participants wear full-length clothing made of natural fibers or fire-retardant materials under their personal protective equipment during live fire evolutions.

Facepiece seal protection: SFRT requires that all students must be compliant with OSHA 29 CFR 1910.134:

“[1910.134\(g\)\(1\)\(i\)](#) -The employer shall not permit respirators with tight-fitting facepieces to be worn by employees who have: [1910.134\(g\)\(1\)\(i\)\(A\)](#) - Facial hair that comes between the sealing surface of the facepiece and the face or that interferes with valve function;” (hair growth between the skin and the facepiece sealing surface, such as stubble beard growth, beard, mustache or sideburns which cross the respirator sealing surface).
